Present Tense

□ Simple Present Tense

The simple present is used to talk about actions, events, or situations that are currently happening, always happening, or generally true.

To form the simple present tense, use the base form of the verb (also known as the **infinitive**) for all subjects, except for third person singular subjects, which add -s or - es to the base form.

Read the following sentences.

- I walk to school every day.
- You study English at the university.
- He takes the bus to work.
- She watches TV in the evenings.
- It rains a lot in this region.
- We play tennis on weekends.
- They live in a big house.







- The simple present tense is also used to express habits, routines, and general truths.
 - I always brush my teeth before going to bed.
 - They usually have breakfast at 7 am.
 - The sun rises in the east and sets in the west.
 - Dogs are loyal animals.
