

Introduction to Adverbs

- An adverb is a word that modifies or describes a verb, adjective, or another adverb in a sentence.
- It answers questions such as how, when, where, why, and to what extent.
- Adverbs can add meaning to verbs, adjectives, and other adverbs in a sentence, giving more information about how something happened, when it happened, and to what degree.
- Adverbs can be single words or groups of words that modify the verb, adjective, or adverb.
- They can be placed at different points in a sentence to create different meanings.

Types of Adverbs:

1. **Adverbs of manner:** describe how something is done. They are usually formed by adding “-ly” to an adjective.

Example: **She sings beautifully.**



2. **Adverbs of place:** describe where something is done.

Example: **The cat is sitting upstairs.**

3. **Adverbs of time:** describe when something is done.

Example: **He arrives early to class.**



4. **Adverbs of frequency:** describe how often something is done.

Example: **She always studies before an exam.**

5. **Adverbs of degree:** describe the level or extent to which something is done.

Example: **He completely finished his homework.**

6. **Interrogative adverbs:** used to ask questions.

Example: **Where did you go?**

7. **Relative adverbs:** used to join two clauses together.

Example: **I visited the place where I grew up.**



Placement of Adverbs:

1. Adverbs can be placed at different points in a sentence to create different meanings.
2. Generally, adverbs are placed as close as possible to the word or phrase they are modifying.
3. When modifying a verb, the adverb usually comes after the verb.

Example: **She sings beautifully.**

4. When modifying an adjective or another adverb, the adverb usually comes before the word it is modifying.

Example: **He speaks very softly.**

5. Adverbs of frequency are usually placed before the main verb in a sentence.

Example: **They always go to the movies on Fridays.**

6. Adverbs of time are usually placed at the beginning or end of a sentence.

Example: **Yesterday, I went to the store.**
