

# Modals

## ⇒ Must

"**Must**" is a modal verb that is used to express strong **obligation** or **necessity**. It is always followed by the base form of a verb.

- "Must" can be used in different tenses, such as **present**, **past**, and **future**, to express obligation or necessity.
- To form negative sentences with "**must**," we use "**must not**" or "**mustn't**" followed by the base form of a verb.
- **For example**, "You mustn't be late for the meeting" or "I must not forget to buy groceries."
- We can use "must" to give **advice**, make **suggestions**, or express a strong **recommendation**.
- **For example**, "You must see that movie, it's amazing!" or "You must try this new restaurant, it's fantastic!"
- "Must" is commonly used in formal situations such as **business meetings**, **interviews**, or **official correspondence**.
- "Must" is often used with the auxiliary verb "have to" to express obligation or necessity.
- **For example**, "I have to finish my report today, I must submit it tomorrow."
- In some cases, "must" can be replaced with "**need to**" or "**have to**" without changing the meaning of the sentence. However, "must" often carries a stronger sense of obligation or necessity.
