⇒ Would

- 🕒 The modal verb "would" is commonly used in English to express a range of meanings, including:

1. **Conditional actions or events:** "If I had more time, I would visit my grandparents."
2. **Polite requests or offers:** "Would you like a cup of coffee?"
3. **Habits or repeated actions in the past:** "When I was a child, I would always play with my toys."
4. **Future in the past:** "He said he would come to the party, but he didn't show up."
5. **Hypothetical or imaginary situations:** "If I were a millionaire, I would travel the world."
6. **Probability or expectation:** "She would probably be late, as she always is."

- 🕒 In negative sentences, "would" is often replaced by "wouldn't" to express the opposite meaning.

⇒ It is important to note that "would" is often used in conjunction with other verbs, such as "could," "should," and "might," to express different nuances of meaning. Additionally, "would" can be used in both the present and past tense.
