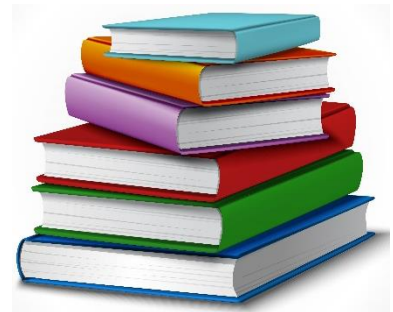


Lowercase:
