



## Statements and Questions

### Definition of a Sentence

A sentence is a group of words that makes complete sense.

**Example:** The sun is shining.

### What is a Statement?

A statement is a sentence that tells something.

#### Features of a Statement:

- It gives information.
- It always ends with a full stop (.).
- It can be about a person, place, animal, or thing.

#### Examples of Statements:

1. My name is Ashok.
2. He is my father.
3. They are my friends.
4. She is my sister.
5. You are my best friend.

### What is a Question?


A question is a sentence that asks something.

#### Features of a Question:

- It asks for information.
- It always ends with a question mark (?).
- It usually starts with a question word like:
  - What, Where, Why, Who, How, When, Do, Are, etc.
- A question is also known as an interrogative sentence.

#### Examples of Questions:

1. What is your name?
2. Why are you crying?
3. Where is your father?
4. Who is your class teacher?



5. Do you know him?

### Grammar Bytes

- A statement always ends with a full stop (.).
- A question always ends with a question mark (?).
- Questions are also called interrogative sentences.

#### Examples from the textbook:

- My name is Rajat. – Statement
- What is your father's name? – Question

#### Exercise B: Add Correct Punctuation

- We are going to school → We are going to school.
- What is your father → What is your father?

### Points to Remember

A sentence that tells something is a Statement.

- Question: Question Mark (?)
