My, Your, His, Her, Their, Our

Possessive Adjectives

Words like my, your, his, her, their, our are called possessive adjectives.

They show ownership or relation.

Examples:

- This is my pencil.
- o That is her bag.
- They love their school.

Usage Table:

Pronoun	Possessive Adjective
I	my
You	your
He	his
She	her
It	its (rarely used)
We	our
They	their

Sentence Formation and Punctuation

Rearranging Words:

Make meaningful sentences by rearranging the jumbled words.

Example:

Words: wheels / has / a / bicycle / two

o Sentence: A bicycle has two wheels.

Punctuation Marks:

- Use a full stop (.) at the end of a statement.
- Use a question mark (?) at the end of a question.

Example:

- She is my aunt. ✓
- What is your name?

Statements vs. Questions

Identifying Sentence Types:

- Statements give information.
- Questions ask something.

Examples:

- The stars shine at night. → Statement
- What is the colour of the dress? → Question

Types of Nouns

Common Nouns:

Names of general items. (e.g., boy, city, car)

Proper Nouns:

Names of specific people/places. (e.g., Rahul, Delhi, India)

Gender in Nouns

Masculine and Feminine:

Identify gender of nouns and convert masculine to feminine.

Masculine	Feminine
Father	Mother
King	Queen
Cock	Hen
Husband	Wife

Sorting Activity:

Put gendered nouns into "He-House" and "She-House".

He-House: Lion, Man, Boy She-House: Girl, Queen, Lioness

Pronouns

Words that replace nouns to avoid repetition.

Common Pronouns:

I, We, You, He, She, It, They

Examples:

- o Riya is my sister. She is in class 2.
- o This is my dog. It loves milk
