Articles – A, An, The

Vowels and Consonants

- There are 26 letters in the English alphabet.
- Vowels: a, e, i, o, u
- All other letters are consonants.

Use of Articles

1. Indefinite Articles: A and An

These are used to talk about any one person or thing, not a specific one.

Use of "A":

Used before words that begin with a consonant sound.

Examples

- ❖ a girl
- a pen
- a book
- ❖ a cat

Use of "An":

Used before words that begin with a vowel sound.

Examples:

- an apple
- an umbrella
- an egg
- an onion
- an hour (h is silent, starts with vowel sound)
- an honest person (h is silent)

Note: It's the sound that matters, not just the first letter.

2. Definite Article: The

"The" is used to refer to specific or definite people or things.

Use of "The":

When referring to specific or known nouns.

Used before:

- o Special names of places, rivers, mountains, books, etc.
- the Gita
- the Red Fort
- the Ganga
- the Earth, the Sun, the Moon
- Pronounced as "thee" (rhymes with she) before vowel sounds:
 - o the apple, the orange

Grammar Byte Tips

- Use "a" before consonant sounds.
- Use "an" before vowel sounds.
- Use "the" before specific things or names.
