Kinds of Sentences

What is a Sentence?

A sentence is a group of words that makes complete sense.

It must:

- Begin with a capital letter.
- Contain a verb.
- End with appropriate punctuation (Full stop, Question mark, or Exclamation mark).

Four Kinds of Sentences

Sentences are classified into four main types based on their purpose:

1. Declarative Sentences (Statements)

- These sentences state or declare something.
- They give information or express an idea.
- End with a full stop (.)

Examples:

- Manav is a clever boy.
- My father is a doctor.

Declarative sentences can be:

- Affirmative: "Rupa is my friend."
- Negative: "Rupa is not my friend."

2. Interrogative Sentences (Questions)

- These sentences ask a question.
- They seek information.
- End with a question mark (?)

Examples:

What is your name?

- ❖ Why are you sad?
- 3. Imperative Sentences (Commands, Requests, Advice)
- These sentences express:
 - o A command
 - o A request
 - An advice
 - Usually end with a full stop (.)

Examples:

- Please give me your notebook. (Request)
- Come here. (Command)
- Do your work regularly. (Advice)

4. Exclamatory Sentences (Strong Feelings)

- These sentences express strong, sudden emotions such as joy, anger, surprise, or sorrow.
- End with an exclamation mark (!)

Examples:

- Hurrah! We have won the match!
- ❖ What a beautiful dress!

Common Error Example:

- Wow! What a big building?
- Wow! What a big building!
