Nouns: Gender

Definition of Gender in Nouns

Gender in grammar refers to the classification of nouns based on sex or the absence of it. There are four types of genders:

i. Masculine Gender

Refers to males.

Examples: man, boy, king, uncle, father, lion

ii. Feminine Gender

Refers to females.

Examples: woman, girl, queen, aunt, mother, lioness

iii. Common Gender

Refers to both males and females.

- **Examples:** doctor, teacher, student, cousin, friend, baby
- These nouns can refer to either gender depending on the context.

iv. Neuter Gender

Refers to non-living things (things without life).

- **Examples:** book, pen, kite, ball, bat, doll, table
- Changing Masculine to Feminine Nouns
- There are three main methods:

1. Using a Different Word Entirely

2. By Adding "-ess" to the Masculine Form.

lion	lioness
host	hostess
actor	actress
poet	poetess
master	mistress
god	goddess
hunter	huntress
priest	priestess
count	countess

Masculine	Feminine
shepherd	shepherdess
jew	jewess

3. Changing a Part of Compound Words.

Masculine	Feminine
stepfather	stepmother
grandfather	grandmother
peacock	peahen
gentleman	gentlewoman

Pronouns and Gender

He – used for masculine gender.

She – used for feminine gender.

It – used for neuter gender.

Examples

- The prince went into the hall. He ate his breakfast.
- The princess went into the hall. She ate her breakfast.
- The uncle loved his nephew very much.
- The aunt loved her niece very much.
