Pronouns

What is a Pronoun?

A pronoun is a word that is used in place of a noun to avoid repetition.

***** Examples:

- Rohan is very naughty. Rohan chases a dog.
 - o Rohan is very naughty. He chases a dog.
- Rupa and Deepa are friends. Rupa and Deepa play together.
 - o Rupa and Deepa are friends. They play together.

Types of Pronouns

1. Personal Pronouns

Used to refer to a person or thing. They are divided into three persons:

Person	Subject Form	Object Form	Possessive Form
First Person	l, we	me, us	mine, ours
Second Person	you	you	yours
Third Person	he, she, it, they	him, her, it, them	his, hers, its, theirs

Examples:

- I am a student. (First person)
- You are my friend. (Second person)
- He is playing cricket. (Third person)
- They are eating lunch. (Third person)

Note:

When mentioning all three persons in a sentence, the order is:

- Second person, Third person, First person
- → You, he and I are friends.

2. Demonstrative Pronouns

Used to point out specific people or things.

Singular	Plural
this	these
that	those

Examples:

- This is my pen.
- That is your book.
- These are my friends.
- Those are mangoes.

3. Possessive Pronouns

Used to show ownership or belonging.

Subject	Possessive Pronoun
I	mine
You	yours
Не	his
She	hers
lt	its
We	ours

Subject	Possessive Pronoun
They	theirs

Examples:

- This pen is mine.
- That bat is yours.
- These books are theirs.
