Interjection

Definition of Interjection

An interjection is a word or phrase that expresses strong and sudden feelings such as:

Joy

- Sorrow
- Praise
- Fun

- Excitement
- Surprise
- Grief

It usually stands alone and is followed by an exclamation mark (!).

Examples of Interjections in Sentences

- 1. Hurrah! Our team has won the match. (Expresses joy)
- 2. Alas! He died of COVID-19. (Expresses grief)
- 3. Bravo! That was a nice shot. (Expresses praise and excitement)

Common Interjections & Their Uses

Interjection	Emotion Expressed
Hurrah!	Joy
Alas!	Grief/Sorrow
Bravo!	Praise/Excitement
Wow!	Surprise/Admiration
Ouch!	Pain
Oh!	Realization/Surprise
Hush!	Urging silence
Hello!	Greeting
What!	Shock/Surprise
Ah!	Realization/Relief

Grammar Note

- An interjection is always followed by an exclamation mark (!)
- It often stands independently and does not grammatically connect with other parts of the sentence.
