## **Subject in Different Sentence Types**

## i. Imperative Sentences

• The subject is always "you", though it is not explicitly stated.

### **Examples:**

- Stand up. (You stand up.)
- Come here. (You come here.)

## ii. Interrogative & Exclamatory Sentences

• Convert to a declarative statement to find the subject.

## **Examples:**

- Where does Harpreet live? → Harpreet lives in Punjab. → Subject: Harpreet
- $\circ$  How beautiful the rainbow is!  $\rightarrow$  The rainbow is very beautiful.  $\rightarrow$  Subject: The rainbow

#### **Points to Remember**

- **Subject:** Who or what the sentence is about.
- **Predicate:** Tells something about the subject.
- Subject = Noun/Pronoun (single word or phrase)
- Predicate = Contains verb (stated or understood), single word or phrase.
