Determiner

What is a Determiner?

A determiner is a word placed in front of a noun to specify, identify, or limit it in some way.

E.g. This car, my book, some water

Difference Between Determiner & Adjective

Adjective	Determiner
Describes a noun	Specifies a noun
E.g. a clever boy (clever = adjective)	E.g. that boy (that = determiner)

Types of Determiners

1. Articles

- a, an, the
- Placed before a noun (or before an adjective + noun)

a/an:

Used with singular, countable nouns.

- a before consonant sounds:
 - a pen, a dog, a university (consonant sound)
- an before vowel sounds:
 - an apple, an hour, an honest person

the:

Used when referring to something specific or already mentioned.

Use 'the':

- **Before superlatives:** the best student
- When a noun represents a whole class: The tiger is a wild animal.

• Unique objects: The Sun, The Earth

• Oceans, rivers, deserts, mountain ranges: The Pacific, The Himalayas

• Famous places/buildings: The Red Fort, The Taj Mahal

• Trains, ships, aircraft: The Titanic

• Nationalities: The Indians

2. Demonstratives

• this, that, these, those

Near	Far
this (singular)	that (singular)
these (plural)	those (plural)

Used with both countable and uncountable nouns.

This water, Those houses

3. Possessives

my, your, his, her, its, our, their
Used to show ownership or possession.

My book, Her pencil, Their house

4. Quantifiers

Tell us about quantity or number.

Used with Countable nouns:

many, several, few, a few, both, any, some
many books, several students, a few questions
Used with Uncountable nouns:

much, little, a little, any, some
much water, a little rice, some milk
Used with Both:

some, any

5. Distributives

• each, every, either, neither

Word	Use
each	Individual items in a group
every	General statement about all
either	One of two
neither	Not one of two

Each child received a gift.

Neither boy spoke.

6. Interrogatives

Used to ask questions.

• what, which, whose, how much, how many

What book? Whose bag? How many pens?

Points to Remember

- A determiner always comes before a noun or adjective + noun.
- Adjectives tell what kind of noun; determiners tell which noun.
- Every noun in a sentence should ideally have a determiner unless it's a proper noun.
