## **Adverb Order**

- Adverbs are words that modify verbs, adjectives, or other adverbs. Like adjectives, the order of multiple adverbs in a sentence follows a specific pattern. The general order of adverbs is:
  - 1. Manner
  - 2. Place
  - 3. Frequency
  - 4. Time
  - 5. Purpose

## **\*** For example:

- She danced gracefully (manner).
- He climbed up the stairs slowly (place).
- They usually meet after school (frequency).
- She arrived early this morning (time).
- He went to the gym to exercise (purpose).
- Adverbs of manner (how something is done) usually come before adverbs of place, time, or frequency. For example: "She speaks English fluently and confidently."
- Adverbs of place (where something happens) usually come before adverbs of time or frequency. For example: "He left the keys here yesterday."
- Adverbs of frequency (how often something happens) usually come before adverbs of time. For example: "I usually go to bed early on weeknights."
- Adverbs of time (when something happens) usually come before adverbs of purpose. For example: "I went to the store this morning to buy some milk."
