En Dashes

- ♣ En dashes (–) are a type of dash that is longer than a hyphen (-) but shorter than an em dash (—). En dashes are typically used to indicate a range or a connection between two things, such as dates, times, or numbers.
 - **!** Here are some common uses of en dashes:
 - 1. To indicate a range of numbers or dates:
 - The conference will take place from June 15–18.
 - The pages 32–45 contain important information.
 - 2. To indicate a connection between two items:
 - The US-Canada border is the longest international border in the world.
 - The London–New York flight takes around seven hours.
 - 3. To indicate a conflict or contrast:
 - The Democratic-Republican debate was heated.
 - The work-life balance is difficult to achieve.
 - 4. To indicate a compound adjective:
 - The post–World War II era was a time of great change.
 - The New York–style pizza was delicious.
- ♣ Note that en dashes should have spaces on either side, except when they are used in a compound adjective. In this case, there should be no space between the en dash and the words it connects.
