 - **Some common uses of hyphens include:**

 - 4. **To indicate a range:** Hyphens are used to indicate a range of numbers, such as 10-15 or 2000-2022.
 - 5. **To join compound modifiers:** When two or more adjectives are used together to modify a noun, a hyphen is used to join them. For example, a well-crafted sentence or a light-blue dress.
