



# Statements and Questions

## Learning Outcomes

- Students will differentiate between a statement and a question.
- They will learn to form questions using question words like what, where, and why.
- They will practice rewriting statements and questions.



## Lead in

Raj and Rupali are talking to each other. They are using two kinds of sentences. Can you guess?



What are you eating?

Can I have one?

I'm eating an apple.

Yes, You can have it.



## Sentence

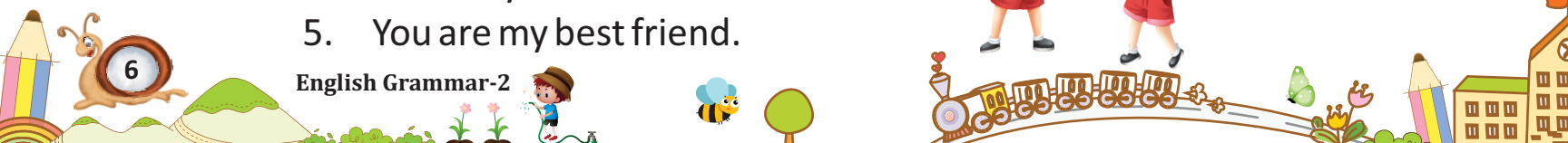
We already know that a group of words that makes a complete sense is called a **Sentence**.

## Statement

A sentence that tells something is called a **Statement**.

### Examples :

1. My name is Ashok.
2. He is my father.
3. They are my friends.
4. She is my sister.
5. You are my best friend.





## Grammar Byte

- ◉ **A Statement** always ends with a full stop (.).

### Question

A sentence that asks something is called a **Question**.

#### Example :

1. What is your name?
2. Why are you crying?
3. Where is your father?
4. Who is your class teacher?
5. Do you know him?



## Grammar Byte

- ◉ A question sentence always ends with a **Question Mark (?)**.
- ◉ A question sentence is also called an **Interrogative Sentence**.

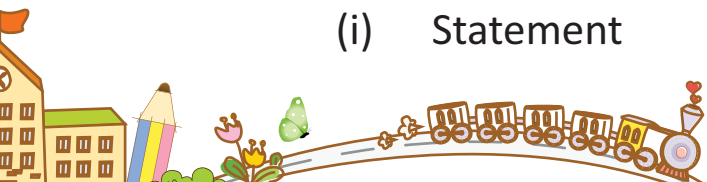
