Types of Sentences

A sentence is a group of words. There are four kinds of sentences – **Statement / Declarative, Interrogative, Imperative** and **Exclamatory**.

Statement

A sentence that gives information or facts is called a **Statement or Declarative Sentence**.

Examples :

1. Manav is a good student.
2. Apple is a fruit.
3. My father has a car.





Grammar Byte

A statement ends with a full stop.

Interrogative Sentence

Sentences that ask questions are called **Interrogative sentences**.

Examples :

1. What is your name?
2. Where do you live?
3. Which is your pen?

An interrogative sentence ends with a question mark (?).

Imperative Sentence

A sentence that gives a command, a request or an advice is called an **Imperative sentence**.

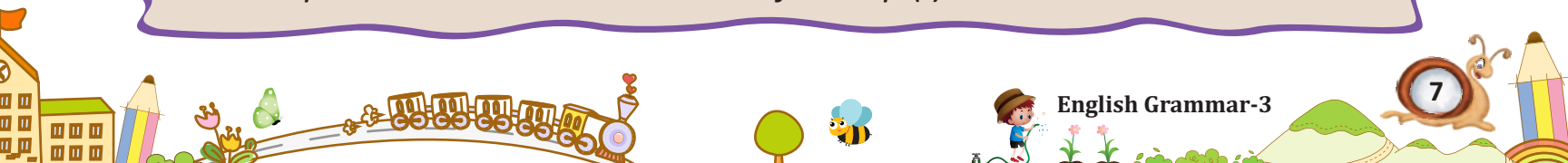
Examples:

1. Come here.
2. Please bring a glass of water.
3. Do not go there.



Grammar Byte

- ⦿ A command orders something.
- ⦿ A request politely tells someone to do something.
- ⦿ An imperative sentence ends with a full stop (.).





Exclamatory Sentence

A sentence that indicates a strong feeling like surprise, fear, excitement and joy is called an **Exclamatory sentence**. These sentences express a strong feeling or emotion. These sentences show surprise, fear, excitement or joy. These sentences end with an exclamation mark (!).

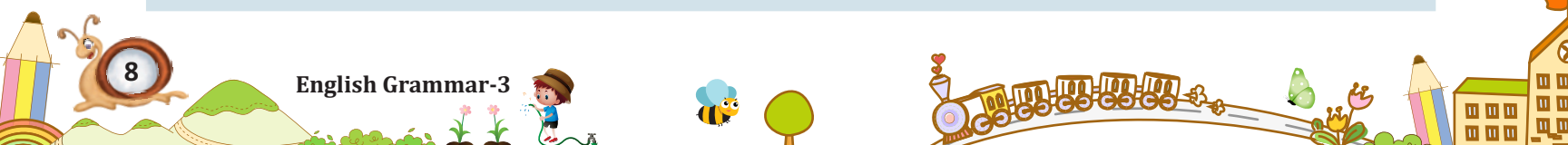
