


#### **Learning Outcomes**

- Students will be able to identify and differentiate between the four types of sentences: declarative, interrogative, imperative, and exclamatory, based on their structure and purpose.
- Students will use the appropriate type of sentence to clearly and effectively convey statements, ask questions, give commands, or express strong emotions in written and spoken language.



A sentence is a group of words. There are four kinds of sentences — **Statement / Declarative**, **Interrogative**, **Imperative** and **Exclamatory**.

#### Statement

A sentence that gives information or facts is called a **Statement or Declarative Sentence**.

#### **Examples:**

- 1. Manav is a good student.
- 2. Apple is a fruit.
- 3. My father has a car.







A statement ends with a full stop.

### Interrogative Sentence

Sentences that ask questions are called Interrogative sentences.

#### **Examples:**

- What is your name? 1.
- Where do you live? 2.
- Which is your pen? 3.



### 🗐 Imperative Sentence

A sentence that gives a command, a request or an advice is called an **Imperative** sentence.

#### **Examples:**

- 1. Come here.
- 2. Please bring a glass of water.
- 3. Do not go there.



- A command orders something.
- A request politely tells someone to do something.
- An imperative sentence ends with a full stop (.).









# Exclamatory Sentence

A sentence that indicates a strong feeling like surprise, fear, excitement and joy is called an **Exclamatory sentence**. These sentences express a strong feeling or emotion. These sentences show surprise, fear, excitement or joy. These sentences end with an exclamation mark (!).
