#### The Sentence

A group of words which makes complete sense is called a sentence.

**Example:** Rohit is a good batsman.

Read the following groups of words carefully.

#### **Group-1**

morning is it a lovely. 1.

pleasant spring a season is 2.









# **Group-2**

- It is a lovely morning. 1.
- Spring is a pleasant season. 2.

The words in group 1 do not make any sense, while the words in group 2 make complete sense. Therefore, the groups of words in group 2 are called sentences.



## Grammar Byte

- A sentence always begins with a capital letter.
- A sentence ends with a full stop (.), a question mark (?) or an exclamation mark (!).

#### **Kinds of Sentences**

#### 1. Statements or Declarative Sentences

A sentence that says or states something is called a **statement** or **declarative sentence**.

#### Read the following sentences.

- 1. Kishore is my best friend.
- 2. You are my brother.
- 3. Riya is a good dancer.
- 4. My father is a doctor.

The above sentences say or state something. These sentences are called **statements** or **declarative sentences**.



A statement or declarative sentence ends with a full stop.

#### 2. Questions or Interrogative Sentences

A sentence that asks a question is called a question or interrogative sentence.

#### Read the following sentences.

- 1. Where is my pen?
- 2. Why are you angry?
- 3. Do you like tea or coffee?
- 4. Are you a doctor?

The above sentences ask questions.

These sentences are called **questions** or **interrogative sentences**.















• A question or interrogative sentence ends with a question mark (?)

#### 3. Imperative Sentences

A sentence that expresses a request, an order or an advice is called an **imperative** sentence.

#### Read the following sentences.

- 1. Please give me a pen.
- 2. Do not make a noise.
- 3. Be careful while crossing the road.



In the above sentences, the first sentence expresses a request, the second sentence expresses an order and the third sentence is an advice.

These sentences are called **imperative sentences**.



• An imperative sentence ends with a full stop.

#### 4. Exclamatory Sentences

A sentence that expresses a strong, sudden feeling is called an exclamatory sentence.

#### Read the following sentences.

- 1. How beautiful the flower is!
- 2. What a beautiful dress that is!
- 3. What a lovely picture this is!

The above sentences express a strong, sudden feeling. These sentences are called **exclamatory sentences**.

These sentences are called **exclamatory sentences**.



An exclamatory sentence ends with an exclamatory mark (!)
