


## **Learning Outcomes**

# Subject and Predicate

Every sentence is made up of two parts—the subject and the predicate.

#### Read the following sentences.

## Donald Trump became the President of the USA.

What is the sentence about? – Donald Trump.

In the above sentence, **Donald Trump** is the first part of the sentence. This is the subject part of the sentence. The second part says something about the subject: **became the President of the USA**. This is the predicate part of the sentence.





- The part of the sentence that tells us what or who the sentence is about is called the subject.
- The part of the sentence that tells us about the subject is called the predicate.
  Example: Switzerland is the heaven on the Earth.
  subject
  predicate















## A subject may be:

#### a noun or a pronoun

#### **Examples:**

- Aishwarya Rai won the Best Actress (critic) award. subject (noun)
- She is a famous Indian actress. 2. subject (pronoun)

## a single word or a group of words

- Kapil is cracking a joke. (subject with a single word)
- 2. The boys swimming in the pond are from Siberia. (subject with a group of words)





# Grammar Byte

- A subject may be a noun or a pronoun.
- A subject may be a single word or a phrase.
- A predicate contains a verb, but sometimes may not be stated.
- A predicate may consist of one word or a group of words.

# Subject in Statements

In statements, the subject is put before the predicate.

**Example:** The mango fell down.

predicate subject

But sometimes, in order to give emphasis on something the order is reversed.

**Example:** Down fell the mango. predicate subject

# Subject in Imperative Sentences

In imperative sentences, the subject is always, 'you'.

In these sentences, the subject is not mentioned.

It is understood.

**Examples:** 1. Stand up.

2. Come here.











• In imperative sentences, the subject is always you, but it is not stated.

## Subject in Interrogative and Exclamatory

#### Read the following sentences.

Where does Harpreet live? (interrogative)

To find the subject first we have to convert the question into statement.

When we convert the question into statement, we will write this sentence as:

2. Harpreet lives in Punjab. (statement)

Now, we can easily identify the subject Harpreet in the statement above.

3. How beautiful the rainbow is ! (exclamatory)

We can convert this sentence into a statement and we will write this sentence as:

4. The rainbow is very beautiful. (statement)

The subject in the above sentence is the rainbow.

Sunita Williams is an American astronaut. She holds the record of most space walk time for a woman (50 hours 40 minutes).





Williams was born in Euclid, Ohio on September 19, 1965. Her father Deepak Pandya was an Indian-American neuroanatomist from Mehsana district, Gujarat. Her mother Ursuline Bonnie Pandya was a Slovene-American. She is the youngest of her three siblings. Williams graduated from Needham High School in 1983. She received a Bachelor of Science degree in physical science



from the United States Naval Academy in 1987. She also pursued a Master of Science degree in engineering management from Florida Institute of Technology.









NASA selected Sunita Williams as an astronaut in 1998. Williams' space journey began with Expedition 14/15 December 2006 to June 2007. She established a world record for females with four space walks spanning 29 hours and 17 minutes. She returned to the Earth with the STS-117 crew in June 2007.
