Words Often Confused

1. **affect** (to influence something): His relatives' interference **affected** their relationship.

effect (a result or to cause something to happen): Her guidance has the strongest effect

on me.

2. **breath** (air that we take in): He was out of **breath** after running for miles.

breathe (the action of taking in air): We should breathe fresh air.

3. **complement** (to complete or make better): This hairstyle **complements** your face.

compliment (praise): He received many **compliments** from his friends after succeeding in the

UPSC exam.

4. **desert** (a dry land): The **desert** is a hot and a dry place.

dessert (a sweet eaten after a meal): I'd love a rasgulla for **dessert**.

5. **feel** (to perceive through touch): The stone **feels** hard.

fill (to make full): Kindly fill the cylinder with gas.

6. **heard** (past tense of hear): I **heard** a faints round.

herd (a group of animals): I saw a **herd** of cattle grazing in the meadow.

7. **its** (belonging to it): The lion killed **its** own cub.

it's (it is): It's very hot in June.

8. **knew** (past tense of know): He **knew** the answers of all the questions.

new (fresh, recent): My uncle bought a **new** car.

9. **loose** (not fastened): Her shoelaces come **loose** as she walked on and on.

lose (to not win): I lose at every games of chess.

10. passed (to proceed without pause): I passed my old school on my way to my

grandmother's house.

past (no longer current or over): Dinosaurs roamed the earth in the past.









11.	principle	(a basic truth, law or assumption): He doesn't cheat. It's against his principle .
	principal	$(the \ first \ or \ foremost): The \ constitution \ is \ the \ \textbf{principal} \ law \ in \ the \ United \ States.$
12.	quiet	(an absence of noise): It's completely quiet at midnight.
	quite	(entirely or completely): That is not quite the right thing to do.
13.	right	(morally good, justified, or acceptable): Always do the right things.
	write	(to compose): I write a letter to my grandpa occasionally.
14.	too	(also or additional): You should not spend too much time watching TV.
	to	(a preposition indicating direction): We went to the park.
