Here is a list of idioms and phrases.

A man of straw (a weak person): He was accused by his opponents of being a man of straw.

A wolf in sheep's clothing (a dangerous person pretending to be harmless): Don't believe the politicians; they are wolves in sheep's clothing.

ABC (very common knowledge): He doesn't know the ABC of Physics.

Again and again (repeatedly): One who tries again and again gets success in the end.

All in all (on the whole, most important): All in all, the excursion was a pleasant one.

At sixes and sevens (persons having different opinions): I don't want to be at sixes and sevens with you.

First and foremost (highest priority) : To be honest and accountable are the **first and foremost** requirements of a good employee.

Hard and fast (certain): There are no **hard and fast** rules to sanction loans in banks.

Heart and soul (with full devotion): He sings with his heart and soul.

Hither and thither (here and there): The refugees ran hither and thither in search of safety.



Hue and cry (great noise): The workers raised a great hue and cry against the new rule.

Ins and outs (full detail): Before starting a new business you must know the ins and outs of it.

Kith and kin (blood relatives): All my **kith and kin** were invited to the marriage of my daughter.

Lock and key (in safe place): She keeps her jewellery under lock and key.

Might and main (with all enthusiasm): If you study with might and main you will surely pass.

Milk and water (weak): The foreign policy of Sri Lanka is a milk and water policy.

Nook and corner (everywhere): He searched for her in every **nook and corner** of the street.

Now and then (occasionally): I visit the church **now and then**.

One's Achilles' heel (a weak point): The corrupt minister was the new government's Achilles' heel.

Out and out (completely): Mahatma Gandhi was an out and out great leader.

Over and above (besides): I paid him rupees fifty thousand over and above what he had demanded.

Pros and cons (merits and demerits): Before signing this agreement you must understand all **the pros** and cons well.

Safe and sound (quite well): She reached home **safe and sound**.
