Voice Basics

In grammar, Voice refers to the form of a verb that shows whether the subject of a sentence performs the action or receives the action. It is the way the relationship between the subject and the action is expressed.

There are two main types of voice in English:

- Active Voice
- Passive Voice

Active vs Passive Voice

Voice Type	Focus On	Structure
Active	The doer (subject)	Subject + Verb + Object
Passive	The receiver (object)	Object + form of "be" + past participle + by + doer



In passive voice, the "doer" can be left out if it's not important.)

Rules of Transformation (How to change voice)

Rule 1: Identify the Subject, Verb, and Object in the Active sentence.

Example: Riya (S) paints (V) a picture (O).

Rule 2: Move the object of the active sentence to the subject position in the Passive.

Rule 3: Use the correct form of the verb "to be" according to the tense and number of the new subject.

Rule 4: Use the past participle (3rd form) of the main verb.

Rule 5: Add "by + doer" (optional-omit if the doer is unknown or unimportant).

Tense-wise Conversion Chart

Tense	Active Voice	Passive Voice
Simple Present	He writes a letter.	A letter is written (by him).
Present Continuous	She is cooking pasta.	Pasta is being cooked (by her).
Present Perfect	They have made a cake.	A cake has been made (by them).
Simple Past	He closed the door.	The door was closed (by him).
Past Continuous	She was cleaning the room.	The room was being cleaned (by her).
Past Perfect	They had built a fort.	A fort had been built (by them).
Simple Future	He will deliver the speech.	The speech will be delivered (by him).
Future Perfect	She will have completed the project.	The project will have been completed (by her).

No passive for Future Continuous.

Passive with Modals & Infinitives

Active Sentence	Passive Sentence
You should do your homework.	Your homework should be done.
He can repair the car.	The car can be repaired.
They must complete the form.	The form must be completed.
I want to read the book.	I want the book to be read.

Use in Formal Writing

We often use passive voice in:

- Reports
- News writing
- · Scientific writing
- When the doer is unknown or unimportant

Example:

- Active: The manager checked the data.
- · Passive: The data was checked. (More formal)






