What is a Paragraph?

A **Paragraph** is a group of sentences about one main idea. It begins with a **Topic sentence**, followed by **Supporting Details**, and ends with a **Concluding Sentence** or smooth connection to the next idea.



1. The Topic Sentence - The Head of the Paragraph

The topic sentence introduces the main idea. It tells the reader what the paragraph is about.

Example:

"Reading books helps us become more creative".

- It is clear
- · It states the main idea
- It grabs attention

2. Supporting Details - The Body Bricks

These are sentences that **explain**, **give reasons**, **examples**, **or facts** related to the topic sentence.

Example:

- Books open our imagination to new worlds.
- They help us learn new words and ideas.
- Many famous inventors were great readers.

3. Logical Flow and Unity - The Glue That Holds It Together

A paragraph should:

- Stay on one topic (Unity)
- Connect sentences smoothly (Flow)
- End with a wrap-up or transition

Example Paragraph:

Reading books helps us become more creative. Books open our imagination to new worlds. They help us learn new words and ideas. Many famous inventors were great readers. That's why reading is a powerful habit that shapes our thinking.

Structure of a Good Paragraph

Part	Purpose	Example
Example	States main idea	"Healthy food keeps our body strong".
Supporting Details	Add facts/examples	"Fruits and vegetables give us vitamins".
Closing Sentence	Ends or links	"So, eating healthy is the key to fitness".
