What is Tense?

Tense is the form of a Verb that shows when something happens Now, Before, or Later.

The Three Main Tense Zones (and their Four Forms)

1. Present Tense - Happens Now

Form	Usage	Example
Simple Present	Daily habits, facts	She reads every day.
Present Continuous	Happening now	She is reading a book.
Present Perfect	Just happened / experience	She has read that book.
Present Perfect ontinuous	Started before and still going on	She has been reading for an hour.



2. Past Tense - Already Happened

Form	Usage	Example
Simple Past	Finished action	He walked to school.
Past Continuous	Was happening in the past	He was walking to school.
Past Perfect	Happened before another past action	He had walked before it rained.
Past Perfect Continuous	Action going on for a while in the past	He had been walking for an hour.

3. Future Tense - Yet to Happen

Form	Usage	Example
Simple Future	Will happen	They will play cricket.
Future Continuous	Will be happening	They will be playing cricket.
Future Perfect	Will have been completed	They will have played before lunch.
Future Perfect Continuous	Will be going on till a point	They will have been playing for two hours.

Sequence of Tenses

In sentences with two clauses, the tense of the main clause affects the tense of the dependent clause.

I'm so tired

Example:

- She said (Past) that she was tired (Past).
- He says (Present) that he **is happy** (Present).

Rule of Thumb:

- Present → Present
- Past → Past
- Future → Future/Present

Usage in Narrative Writing

Tense consistency is important in **stories** and **diary entries**!

Most stories are written in the **Past Tense**:

The sun was shining. The children ran to the park. They were laughing and playing.

But sometimes, in personal essays or live commentaries, we use the **present tense**:

I am standing on the stage. The lights are blinking, and the audience is cheering.


