Some clauses can stand tall and proud on their own, while others need a little help. Let's find out who's who!

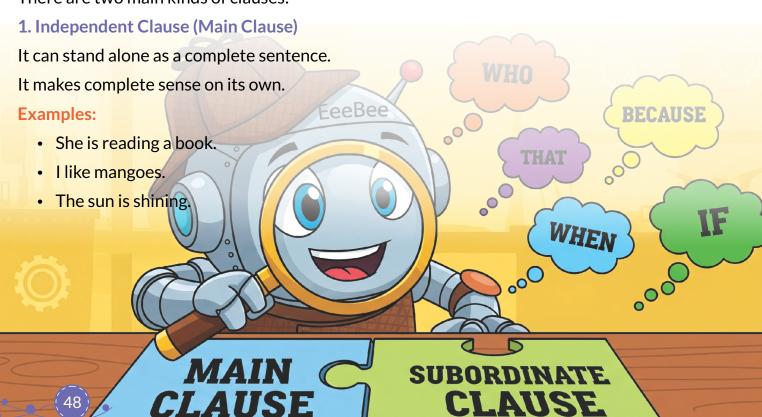

What is a Clause?

A Clause is a group of words with a Subject and a Verb.

There are two main kinds of clauses:



2. Dependent Clause (Subordinate Clause)

It cannot stand alone as a complete sentence.

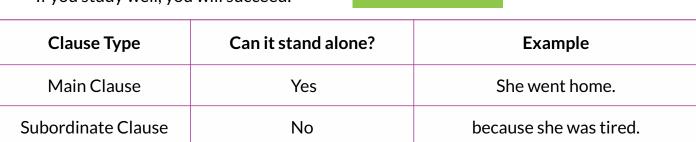
It depends on the main clause to make full sense.

Examples:

- · Because it was raining
- When I reached school
- If you study well

These are incomplete without another clause:

- Because it was raining, we stayed Indoors.
- If you study well, you will succeed.



Meet the Subordinate Clauses

Subordinate clauses can't stand alone they depend on a main clause to make sense.

1. Noun Clauses

They act like a Noun in the sentence.

- I know that she is honest.
- What he said surprised everyone.

2. Adjective Clauses

They describe a Noun like Adjectives do.

- The book that you gave me is amazing.
- I saw the girl who won the prize.

3. Adverb Clauses

They tell when, why, how, or under what condition like adverbs.

- I stayed inside because it was raining.
- He smiled when she arrived.





Combining Clauses

We often combine clauses to create complex sentences using joining words like:

Use	Conjunctions/Subordinators	
Reason	because, since	
Time	when, while, as soon as	
Condition	if, unless	
Contrast	although, even though	
Purpose	so that, in order that	
Description	who, which, that	

- I didn't sleep well because the dog was barking.
- We will go to the park if it doesn't rain.

Clause vs Phrase

Feature	Clause	Phrase
Has Subject + Verb?	√ Yes	X No
Makes complete sense?	√ Sometimes	X Never completely
Example	She runs	after the long race

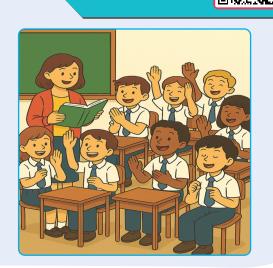
LISTENING FOR FEELINGS

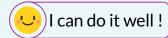

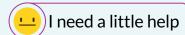


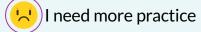
Concept	Example
