Did you notice something?

Each underlined word tells us how, where, or when something happened.

These are called **Adverbs!**

Read this:

- 1. The dog barked **loudly**.
- 2. She threw the ball far.
- 3. He stood quietly.

- 4. They arrived **yesterday**.
- 5. The game happened here.



What is an Adverb?

An **Adverb** is a word that modifies a **Verb**, **Adjective**, or **Another Adverb**. It tells **How**, **When**, **Where**, or **to What Extent**.

Types of Adverbs

Туре	Tells Us	Examples
Adverb of Manner	How something happens	Quickly, slowly, happily, badly
Adverb of Time	When something happens	Today, yesterday, soon, now
Adverb of Place	Where something happens	Here, there, upstairs, nearby
Adverb of Frequency	How often it happens Always, often, sometime	
Adverb of Degree	To what extent	Very, quite, too, almost, enough

Position and Order of Adverbs

Most Adverbs come after the Verb or between the Subject and Verb (especially with auxiliaries). But some may be placed at the beginning or end for emphasis.

Examples:

- She sings beautifully. (manner after verb)
- He always eats lunch at noon. (frequency before verb)
- Yesterday, we visited a museum. (time at the beginning)
- They will come **here**. (place at the end)

Comparison of Adverbs

Like adjectives, adverbs can also be compared.

Degree	Example with "fast"	Example with "happily"
Positive	fast	happily
Comparative	faster than	more happily than
Superlative	fastest	most happily

Note: Most -ly adverbs use "more" and "most" to compare.







Adverbial Phrases and Clauses

Adverbial Phrase:

• A group of words that act like an Adverb and modify the Verb.

Examples: He spoke in a low voice.

Adverbial Clause:

• A dependent clause that functions as an Adverb.

Examples: She danced as if nobody was watching.




